

In 2007, Hospice & Community Care purchased land at 4075 Old Harrisburg Pike and built the Pathways Center for Grief & Loss and The Bob Fryer & Family Inpatient Center which opened in September 2008. Ten years later,

Grief Support...Responding to the Needs of Our Community

Students, School Faculty and Leadership Support

In 2018, local students were impacted by numerous unexpected tragedies—from vehicle accidents to suicides to overdoses, as well as serious illness. Specially-trained bereavement counselors from Hospice & Community Care's Pathways Center for Grief & Loss were called to assist students, parents and school administrators in coping with these

tremendous losses, providing support, resources and guidance in the face of loss.

We provided tailored support to those who were grieving a loss in the community, including

schools, workplaces and senior living communities.

We also supported more than 100 children, teens and their families through our Coping Kids & Teens series. Through the series, 140 individualized support groups were held for young children, school-aged kids and teenagers, plus their parents or guardians throughout the year.

Support After a Substance Passing

When an individual dies from addiction or overdose it has a significant impact on those left behind. Hospice & Community Care partnered with Marjorie Paradise, a local psychologist whose daughter died from addiction, to form a local GRASP group (Grief Recovery After a Substance Passing). Offered at the Pathways Center for Grief & Loss, the program provides compassion, understanding and support for individuals who have had a loved one die as a result of substance abuse or addiction.

Meeting Patients and Families Where They Are in York County

Hospice Care at WellSpan York Hospital

Hospice & Community Care partnered with WellSpan York Hospital in 2018 to launch the Hospice Response Team. The first of its kind locally, the program enables us to provide exceptional care and comfort to hospitalized patients who are seriously ill and have a 72-hour or less life expectancy.

Our team of specially-trained nurses, aides, social workers and spiritual clergy work collaboratively with WellSpan York Hospital's team to provide the support these patients and families need at the most fragile time of life. Since its launch, we have provided care to 339 patients and their families.





Expansion into The Ann B. Barshinger Hospice Center

In 2018, Hospice & Community Care opened its new York office, The Ann B. Barshinger Hospice Center, at 235 St. Charles Way, York, thanks to the generous support of philanthropist and York County native, Ann Barshinger. In our first year at this new location, we saw significant growth—serving 989 hospice patients and families, an increase of 300 patients compared to 2017. Grief and loss support

Your Dollars at Work in 2018

As one of the few non-profit hospices serving Central Pennsylvania, we rely heavily on the generous support of our many donors.

Community support covers the gap between the actual cost of care and what Hospice & Community Care is reimbursed from Medicare or other insurances.

And it is because of that support that we are able to ensure that all patients and families, regardless of their financial circumstances, receive care and support.

- A record-setting 131 Women's Giving Circle members pooled their annual contributions to fund \$65,500 in projects and services that support our patients and families.
- The community donated nearly \$3.8 million through memorial contributions, bequests, online donations, gifts to special endowment funds, corporate sponsorships, IRA contributions, and participation in special events.
- 89% of caregivers surveyed would recommend Hospice & Community Care to their friends and families 4% higher than the national average.
- 2,577 adults, teens, and kids attended support groups at the Pathways Center for Grief & Loss. This support is available to anyone in the community who has lost a loved one through illness or sudden, tragic circumstances.

- Hospice social workers made 12,471 visits to support families.
- More than 1,400 music and massage therapy visits were made to comfort our patients.

■ Hospice & Community Care chaplains made 6,451 visits to provide support to patients and their families.

- Hospice aides made more than 26,000 visits to care for our patients.
- 1,500 breakfast logs and 4,900 whoopie pies were sold at the Labor Day Auction!
